What is a Serious Injury?

Serious injuries are defined by the Occupational Health and Safety Act and Regulations and includes fractures, amputations, sight loss, serious internal haemorrhages, burns that require medical attention, any injury caused by explosives, asphyxiation or poisoning by gas that results in a loss of physical control, or another injury that is likely to endanger life or cause permanent injury. Any injury that causes unconsciousness, results in substantial blood loss, or places life in jeopardy is also considered a serious injury.

Serious injuries must be reported to the OHS Division of Service NL as per Section 10 of the OHS Act.

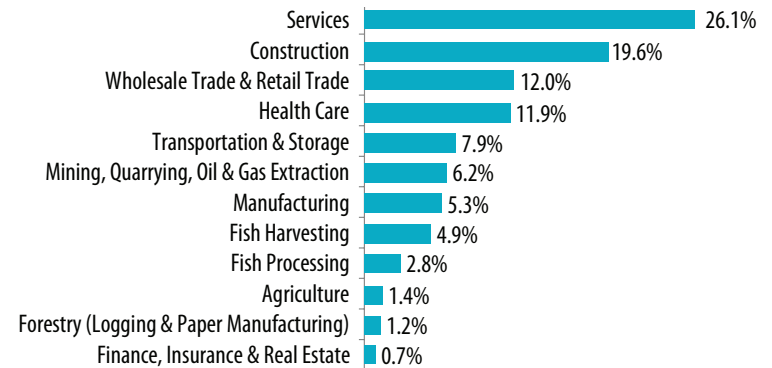

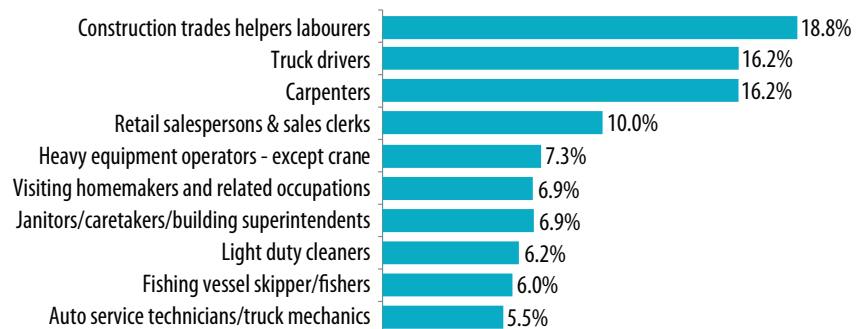
Most serious injury claims are in the service and construction industries (45.7 per cent of all serious injury claims).

- Impact on quality of life

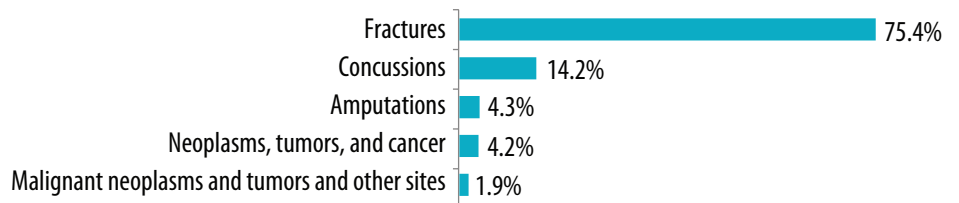
Employers

- Deterioration in morale and confidence in employer's commitment to workplace health and safety

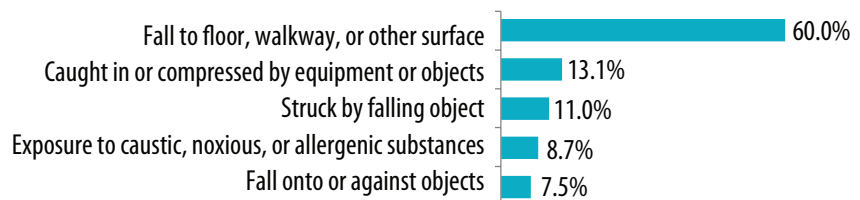
How can serious injuries be prevented?

- Provide adequate supervision of workers
- Educate and train workers
- Conduct regular and thorough workplace inspections
- Carry out regular preventative maintenance
